I started at the end of Korte Nieuwstraat. A fortification wall with a sloping pavement. The pavement is very uneven. I run my hand along the wall and hold my other hand in front of me to feel for bicycles.

Arriving at the intersection, I am approached for the first time. "What are you doing, are you okay?" I explain that I am from a festival and that I have to walk down Nieuwstraat. The man is on a bicycle and turns out to be from the city-police. He lets me pass and points me in the right direction.
